March 2024

Methodology

Focus Groups

- Conducted 4 focus groups on February 21-22, 2024
- Each 90 min in length, online, and with 6-7 participants from a mix of states
- Qualitative research findings are directional and not projectable onto the population at large

FEBRUARY 21st

- Group 1: Unmarried women over 35, not registered to vote
- Group 2: Women under 35, not registered to vote

FEBRUARY 22ND

- Group 3: Latinos & Latinas, not registered to vote
- Group 4: Men under 35, not registered to vote

Participants self-report they are not registered to vote, which likely makes them less available than the many people who overreport their registration but are not actually registered.

- Unregistered voters feel burdened but hold hope for the future.
- Many feel disconnected from their local communities, finding more meaning in communities based on shared values and interests rather than just proximity.
 - Cultural differences can deepen feelings of exclusion among people of color.
- Most participants are deeply uninterested in registering and voting, which they see as intertwined.
- Abortion, local issues, and social pressure can prompt non-voters to reconsider their stance on voting.
- Barriers and obstacles to voter registration range widely from logistical and informational challenges to doubts about the impact of their vote.
- Some feel powerless, believing elections are predetermined by powerful entities and influenced by money in politics. Only a few believe in the power of collective action.

Understanding Unregistered Voters

Social Media Exerts Significant Influence On These Audiences





Participants spend a substantial amount of time consuming information on social media platforms. TikTok is by far the most used platform for this audience.

• Topics include cleaning, cooking, health and wellness, travel, beauty, car shows, or even how to invest in cryptocurrencies.

"My guilty pleasure is TikTok. I'm **addicted to TikTok**, I can scroll through it for hours and not realize what's going on." *"It's really easy [for TikTok] to get my attention. So, I'll watch a whole 2-hour movie in 30 second intervals on TikTok."*

YouTube, Instagram, and Facebook are also widely used social media platforms.



Some also mention watching a variety of TV shows on cable or streaming platforms like Netflix, Amazon Prime, or Paramount Plus.

Notably, none of the participants voluntarily mention they follow the news.

Personal Situation	A majority express stress about their current situations and concerns about what might come next. Some are concerned with the economy and the rise in prices and difficulties of job prospects. Others are stressed about managing their daily lives, from parenting to school to work.

Life Decisions Make Younger Participants Anxious But The Future Offers Hope; Older Participants Exhibit More Confidence In Life Choices

Younger participants are anxious about making the right decisions.

"I think I already made a little mistake in my career, and I realized I wanted to do something different... but I'm scared of making that mistake now."

"I'm wondering if college was the right option right out of high school. A lot of my buddies started working right out of high school and they're making pretty decent money. I'm thinking about what my future is going to be and if I made the rights choices."

Older respondents tend to feel proud of where they are in life.

"I've accomplished something in every arena... there's a lot left to accomplish, but I can feel myself stacking wins and rolling with the punches better than I used to."

"I feel accomplished in my business. I feel accomplished with my children. They're grown. They're doing well for themselves. I feel proud of that. **Some of my dreams that I used to have are now my reality**."

Younger participants balance their concerns with hope for what the future holds.

"I would like to say my school career is going well, I just started. I'm a freshman. I think I'm off to a good start." "Just thinking about what my future is going to be and if I made the right choices... I think I'm on the right track."

"I just write on a paper, just a list of some things I'm looking towards to do and just do a vision board."

Small businesses and local events connect some to their communities



"The city has a lot of traditions. Right now, the month of February, we have festivals, where we celebrate Black history... there's all kinds of **events, music, art, speakers**."


Isolation from Community

- This lack of connection stems from less daily interaction with neighbors, which some attribute to growing time spent online, children not playing together outside as much, or small neighborhood disputes.
- Some say this feeling has grown over time and recall communities feeling more connected before.

"Growing up, I feel like community was more of a thing than it is now. It's almost like everyone has their own house or their own stuff going on, and it's easy to become isolated."

"The children are not outside. And usually sometimes you'll make friends through the children, you know. You'll meet other parents and things like that. But there's no one outside. Everyone just goes about their day and does what they're doing."



"It could be not necessarily the community that's so in their own bubble. It might be **myself as well that's in a bubble**."

"My neighborhood has an HOA, and the members were pretty active there, and it **got pretty hostile**... It's just funny that it was **such petty things that people are fighting over**."

Some respondents of color voice unique difficulties and challenges they have experienced in their communities, facing discrimination, ignorance, and difficulties in making connections.

"I live in Miami... I think I speak English good, but sometimes people say, 'you don't speak English, like I don't understand what you're saying.' So, you prefer not to talk, not to open up."

"I am Latina, but I don't look Latina. I don't sound Latina... I have **experienced discrimination in other ways with people speaking in front of me in Spanish and not realizing that I understand what they're saying**, I speak fluent Spanish."

"I was out the other day... in the grocery line... the person behind me is like, "What's Black History Month?" And I thought they were joking. She's like: 'Oh, I've never known. I thought it was just February, like I thought it was Valentine's month.""

Voter Registration: Opportunities & Barriers



In This Hard-To-Move Audience, There Are Some Opportunities For Openness To Registering To Vote



Abortion

"The only time I thought about voting was for the abortion bill that was proposed [in Ohio]. I didn't vote for that one either, clearly because I'm not registered, but I would have applied or registered to vote to solely vote for the abortion bill because I was highly [for] it."

"There's probably more power in smaller communities to get who they want to be elected but I always forget about that. And I always just say presidential when I think of voting."

"Maybe you could **make more of an impact** if you are really looking at local [issues]."



Influence from Family/Friends

"The first time I voted was a midterm and my sister and I were roommates... she just bugged me: come, vote with me, we're going together. So, I did it then. I've just been gradually less interested personally. But that time I was like, 'Okay, you know, whatever you say. If it's really important to you. I'll come with you.'"

So, we'd rather just focus on the things that are going right in our lives and what we can control rather than taking the time to be a part of registering to vote or picking one or the other."
		Participants see registering to vote and actually voting as part of the same process.

Registering to vote makes no sense unless you plan on voting.

Some Believe Elections Are Predetermined Or Manipulated By Powerful Entities And Note A Strong Link Between Money And Politics

Manipulated Elections

- Some wonder if a group of people who have an agenda are manipulating the process and the results of elections for their self-interest but are not clear on who is pulling the strings.
- Other participants connect the extreme wealth corporations and CEOs have with advertising and media manipulation.

"I feel like corporations and people with money, like the powers that be, **are still going to be the powers that be and whoever is in that chair as President doesn't matter**. All the same people who are pulling the strings are going to probably keep on pulling the strings."

"Pretty much, it feels like there's a puppet master that organizes all these things, all the manipulative tactics they have in the media, they have a way to sway the vote or change the votes after you voted. Feels like it's already been decided."
