

# **POLLING for the PEOPLE**

Survey of likely voters in states with little or no VBM history | July 2020

### Methodology



Change Research polled 1,497 likely voters from June 22-24, 2020 in states with limited or no history of voting by mail:

Georgia New Hampshire South Carolina

Kentucky New Mexico Virginia

Michigan Nevada Wisconsin

North Carolina Pennsylvania

Dynamic Online Sampling was used to attain a representative sample of the electorate. Post-stratification weighting was performed on state, age, gender, race/ethnicity, and education, and 2016 presidential vote.

The margin of error as traditionally calculated is  $\pm 2.53\%$  and larger among subgroups.

## **Key findings**




- The vast majority of respondents report usually voting in person, consistent with the design of this survey, but a considerable number would prefer to vote by mail in November.
- The plurality do not know the rules about voting by mail in their state.
- Voters are more swayed by the health risks of in-person voting than by logistical concerns; these health-related concerns are particularly pronounced among the Rising American Electorate (18-34 year olds, voters of color, and unmarried women).
- Voters do have concerns about mail-in ballots not arriving safely, though those concerns are less prevalent among RAE voters.
- When it comes to voting by mail, respondents are most compelled by the assurance that coronavirus will not impede their ability to cast their votes.

## Typical method of voting




#### How do you usually vote?

Regardless of how you have voted in the past, how would you prefer to vote in the upcoming presidential election in November?




### **Knowledge of VBM rules**



Many states are changing rules about voting by mail in response to coronavirus. In {{ STATE }}, which statement best describes the current rules for voting by mail, or are you not sure?


- Election officials will send all voters a mail ballot.



#### Reasons to vote in person


